



The City of Port Phillip has an ff km foreshore on the northern edge of Port Phillip Bay and south of the Melbourne central business district.







# Comparative Reports – Cost of Library Service per Visit










## Steering Committee


### The Local Government Performance Reporting Steering Committee will:


- oversee an annual program of review and continuous improvement to the Local Government Performance Reporting Framework (LGPRF)
