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2023-24 financial audits

Model financial report and performance statement

LGV released the 2023-24 model financial report and performance statement on 23 February 2024.

Councils are encouraged to prepare shell accounts prior to 30 June 2024.

Key areas of focus:

Financial report

- Valuation of land, buildings and infrastructure assets
- Government funding
- Provision for landfill
- Information technology controls as they relate to financial reporting

Performance statement

- Compliance with the model performance statement, noting there are changes to the indicators to be audited
- Systems in place to capture financial and non-financial data underpinning the reported results

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Valuation of land, buildings and infrastructure assets

We recommend that finance teams, prior to 30 June each year, prepare and present a paper to their audit and risk committee that outlines:

- the requirements of the council's accounting policy with respect to property, infrastructure assets, plant and equipment
 - □ the asset capitalisation threshold
 - □ which asset classes are recorded at cost v's fair value
 - □ the frequency of assets valuations
- date of the last independent valuation by asset class
- their approach to assessing the fair value of each class of property, infrastructure assets, plant and equipment in the current year
 - the asset classes scheduled for an independent revaluation in the current year v's those subject to a desktop valuation
 - > reference point for a desktop valuation (i.e. Rawlinsons construction guide or ABS producer price indice)
 - □ how asset condition data is captured and considered in the fair value assessment
 - key assumptions being adopted
 - key milestones being worked towards
- likely outcomes for the respective reporting cycle (expected movements in fair value relative to the existing carrying amount and resultant impact on the financial report).

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Results of 2022-23 Audits: Local Government report

The *Results of 2022-23 Audits: Local Government report* was tabled in parliamentary on 7 March 2024 https://www.audit.vic.gov.au/report/results-2022-23-audits-local-government

The report

- provides a summary of outcomes from our audit of the local government sector for 2022-23
 - □ largely focus on the 79 Victorian councils
 - Contains an analysis and discussion of financial outcomes and emerging risks
 - details key internal control and financial reporting issues
- contains 6 recommendations
 - □ 4 directed to all councils

Our website also contains a financial dashboard with 6 years of financial data by council.

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Annual reporting timelines

- The *Local Government Act 2020* requires council annual reports which includes the audited financial reports and performance statements associated audit reports to be finalised no later than one day prior to the election in a general election year.
- To meet annual financial reporting timelines, an entity should have a plan that:
 - outlines its legislative reporting requirements
 - details tasks to be performed, by whom and when
 - specifies the resources, milestones, key stakeholders, information systems, materiality threshold, oversight and quality assurance practices it needs to help the staff who prepare it.

Council election October 2024

- A general Council election is currently scheduled to occur on 26 October 2024.

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


Tabled May 2024 Examined whether the Department of Education (the department) is improving literacy and numeracy achievement outcomes for all Victorian government school students.
